Getting the Most Out of Your Law Library — David Belanger, Delaware County Library System Counties are required to maintain a law library by state statute, which may not be used to their full extent. There are opportunities for collaboration with public libraries to enhance outreach and improve public awareness of the law library's resources. These opportunities include from answering legal reference questions; including law library holdings in the public library's online catalog; to housing the law library in a public library.
